RECOVERY HOME FOR ADOLESCENT FEMALES



The Monarch Marlowe House, a prairie-style home located adjacent to the Rosecrance Griffin Williamson Adolescent Campus, is the first home built to specifically meet the needs of the young women in the Rosecrance Monarch Recovery Home program. The Monarch program provides adolescent females 15-20 years of age who have completed a primary addiction treatment program a place to live and grow in their recovery in a safe and supportive environment. Rosecrance's Monarch Houses are the only licensed long-term residential recovery homes for girls in the state of Illinois. Only a handful of similar homes exist in the nation. The total project cost was met through fundraising. Rosecrance Foundation Board members Lisa Lindman and Robert Rhea were campaign co-chairs for this project. The lead gift was provided by philanthropist Marjorie Brookman Marlowe for whom the home is named.

FEATURES OF MONARCH MARLOWE HOUSE:

- Capacity: 14 girls
- Six bedrooms, seven bathrooms including one of each with wheelchair access
- Fully accessible to girls with disabilities
- Sunny rooms with window seats in every bedroom
- Great room with fireplace for living/dining area
- Full commercial kitchen
- Library and study area
- Spacious family room
- Screened-in porch and patio
- Laundry and storage areas
- Small fitness area
- Fire sprinkler and security system

Adjacent to the Rosecrance Griffin Williamson Adolescent Campus to allow use of Serenity Garden, recreational fields, fitness center and additional support services.
