Gina's View

I have a great life today because I decided to surrender. By surrendering all, I gained everything.

My name is Gina and I am a recovered addict with five years of sobriety. I began drinking at the age of 13 and using Ecstasy at the age of 15.

Eventually, I tried heroin believing it was cocaine. I got very sick and stopped breathing for a long time. I almost died that night, but it did not phase me. Heroin quickly became a habit. It absorbed every waking moment of my life. Daily hygiene, eating, and sleeping became practically nonexistent.

After a while, I sought help at an outpatient drug program but was still using drugs. I transferred into their inpatient program. I detoxed from heroin and was put on a drug that prevented me from getting high. If I tried to use, it would make me sick.

The medicine kept me clean for about 5 ½ months, but eventually I stopped taking it. While working at a local nightclub, I was asked if I knew where to get some cocaine. I went to my old connections and in the midst of delivering the cocaine, I tried it.

Cocaine robbed me of everything. I couldn't look in the mirror because I was disgusted at who I was and what I had become. Despite multiple nosebleeds and poor hygiene, I continued to go to meetings to fool my family and friends into thinking I was all right.

Soon people noticed I was getting high again and I had to go back to treatment. I chose Rosecrance. I stayed at Rosecrance for over three months, and I learned a lot about myself, but wasn't willing to change. Prior to discharge, it was recommended that I go to a Monarch House, but I refused. Instead, I went home to graduate with my high school class.

I graduated, but relapsed the next day. I went on a two-week binge and spent over \$5,000 on crack and heroin. I stole and sold everything I had to get high. I lived out of my car because fear, guilt and shame kept me from going home. I had manipulated and

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taken advantage of anything and everybody I'd ever loved, especially my family.

At the end of the binge, I decided I didn't want to continue living this way. I went back to Rosecrance and entered the Monarch House program. At Monarch, I held a full-time job at Rosecrance's RoseTech Industries, started Rock Valley College, and began to mend relationships. I spoke at local high schools and saw how my experience could benefit others.

Life changed drastically when my sponsor was hit by a drunk driver and died five days later. Without the support of the Monarch staff, I could not have made it through that time.

After I graduated from Monarch, I moved into my own apartment and got involved in the recovery community. I started a young woman's meeting at the Griffin Williamson Campus, helped run a weekly meeting at Harrison Campus and began a group at the Winnebago County Jail.

In the last year, I got married and moved into my first home. This year we will be expecting our first child, a son. I have a life better than I could have imagined. I'm forever grateful. ■
